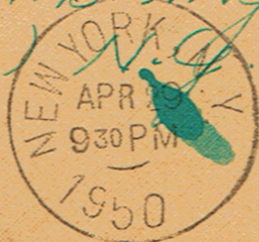

Dear Children:-

As Idene says "never a dull moment". Things are moving about the same way with us. I stepped out to exchange the time of day with Horace the other day and he says I am tired, want to come over?
